FROM THE CHAIRMAN – INTRODUCING MYSELF – JENNY LEWIS

This is the first of a series of profiles of members, starting with the Committee.

I started learning to make lace over 40 years ago in Olney, N. Bucks. I am a founder member of Olney Lace Circle (OLC) and am now an Honorary Life Member. I still try to go there 2 or 3 times a year to all-day Pillow Parties and Lace Days. My 3 daughters all learnt to make lace and my eldest daughter is also a member of OLC, which still meets as a lace-making group every week.

As many of you will know, in the early days, we had to make our own lace pillows as you couldn't buy them. The one I made was considered by my teacher to be very good and she suggested that I should make them for sale – which I did. If you bought a straw pillow from Audrey Sells, D J Hornsby, Tim Parker, or The English Lace School in the late 70's I probably made it! Dennis

Hornsby also used one of my pillows as a mould for his first polystyrene pillows – but I didn't receive any commission!

Until I moved to Poole 19 years ago, I only made lace once a week in the evening group of OLC, but in Poole I joined Liz Pass' Thursday class, Di Pemberton's U3A group and PBLC. As there was no opportunity to make lace weekly as part of PBLC, Eve (who I met at Liz's class) and I decided to start a weekly self-help group, so Tuesday Lace as part of PBLC was born. It is open to all members and in July we averaged 23 attendees.

Along with several other members of PBLC, I belong to Christchurch Lace Society because we can make lace all day. I have also been a member of The Lace Guild since magazine no. 13 and I have all those magazines in a cupboard!

The other thing that you need to know about me is that I am deaf. I have a Cochlear Implant which gives me fairly good hearing but I also rely on lip-reading. If you are talking to me, please make sure that I can see your face. If a battery fails, I cannot hear a thing and have to change it immediately.

I know that there are others in PBLC with hearing difficulties, so for that reason we will be using the microphone for all talks and announcements. If you can't hear what is being said, please let me know.

I hope that you will be happy with me as Chairman – I welcome your feedback and any ideas or suggestions you may have.

At 4pm Jean and I packed up all the display and equipment. I think all went well and everyone, demonstrators and visitors had an enjoyable time. I would like to thank all the demonstrators who helped make this, our first show in two and half years, a great success.

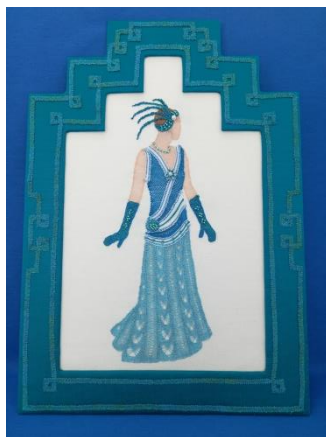

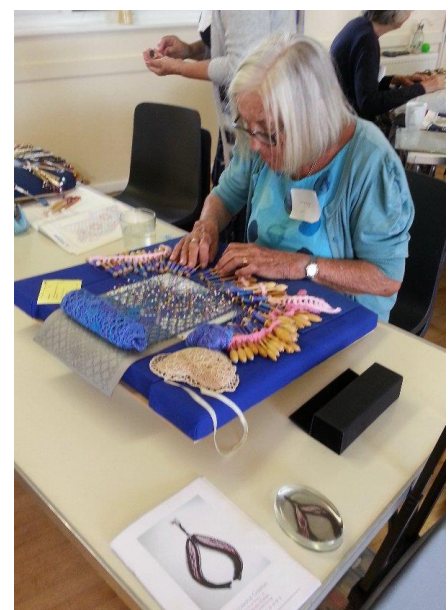
PBLC VISIT TO STOUR LACE GROUP
